The highlight of the few days in Adelaide was undoubtedly the presentation from the Youth Forum on the final morning. What we witnessed re-inspired and re-invigorated many people, and I hope you all had the opportunity to visit the WSA website **worldskills.org.au** to get a flavour of what was presented. I look forward to the continued involvement with WSA of all Youth Forum attendees and indeed all past competitors, and I look forward to implementing their ideas as we all continue to 'spread the word'.

2011 for WSA was a Regional Competition year and an International Pathway year. While we are yet to have final numbers confirmed, it appears that we will see a growth in Regional Competitions around the country which is a testament to the hard work of our regional committees and the willingness of young Australians to test themselves and to strive for skills excellence. Of course, with the 2011 Team Australia *Skillaroos* and the 2011 BBM Scholarship winners, those who are competing at the Regional level have tremendous role models to follow. Thanks to the very generous ongoing support of BBM, WSA has been able to provide a valuable International Pathway to 13 National Gold Medallists which included a leadership course in the UK, a visit to the 41st WorldSkills International Competition in London and international work experience – all of which provided each recipient with the perfect opportunity to further develop their personal and professional skills.

Many in the international WorldSkills community ask me why Australia consistently performs to a high standard; without hesitation, my answer is always the same – it is due to the people involved with WSA.

And while outside the 2010/2011 year, as I write this report, the 41st WorldSkills International Competition in London has been held and everyone involved with WSA, and indeed all Australians, should be extremely proud of the fact that we have been able to secure another top ten finish – 7th in the world. INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS

WorldSkills International Competitions run every two years, with 2013 being the next International Competition year. WorldSkills Australia is one of the 58 WorldSkills International member countries who bring a team of their most highly skilled trainees and apprentices to compete in the world's largest skills competition.

WorldSkills International Competitions are run over four days and also include events such as welcome functions. familiarisation events and opening and closing ceremonies.

Competitors have had to advance from Regional and National levels to prove their commitment and skills in their chosen field and the International Competition is the ultimate test.

After a successful bid, it has been announced the 42nd WorldSkills International Competition will be held in Leipzig Germany in July of 2013.

THEGLOBAL SKILLS CHALLENGE WOLLONGONG, NSW 2011

On July 5-8, 2011, over 80 competitors from eight WorldSkills International member countries gathered in Wollongong, NSW, for what turned out to be the biggest international skills competition held in Australia since 1988, the Global Skills Challenge.

The four-day event was hosted by WorldSkills Australia in conjunction with TAFE NSW Illawarra Institute, Wollongong Campus and was designed to provide the 2011 Team Australia *Skillaroos* and a selection of their international peers with a vital training exercise in preparation for the 41st WorldSkills International Competition in London.

Competitors travelled from countries including France, UK, Jamaica, Japan, Netherlands, New Zealand, Singapore and Canada to participate in the rigorous, high-quality competition against some of the world's most highly skilled young people. WorldSkills Australia would like to thank both the sponsors and volunteers who provided their support at the Global Skills Challenge, in particular TAFE NSW Illawarra Institute, who helped to make it such a hugely successful event.

The Global Skills Challenge gave the *Skillaroos* a real taste of some of the conditions they would be facing in a few months time. The only thing missing would be the crowds of up to 150,000 and an international media contingent. The competitors showed great control and focus as they completed their time demanding and difficult challenges.

This exercise provided the *Skillaroos* and their experts with time to work together to identify strengths and weaknesses, to gauge their international competitors and to pinpoint what the main training areas for the next few months would be.

41st WORLDSKILLS INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION, LONDON 2011

THE LARGEST INTERNATIONAL SKILLS COMPETITION IN HISTORY:

The 41st WorldSkills International Competition was held at the ExCeL London, international exhibition and convention centre. The venue, spanning 90,000 sq metres in size, saw over 200,000 people filling up the halls to watch the world's best battle it out for gold, over four intense days of competition, in the world's largest skills showdown ever.

The 28 Team Australia *Skillaroos* made up a small-but-strong portion of the 931 competitors who converged on the competition site from 51 different countries/regions across the globe, representing over 46 specialised skill areas.

Large audiences gathered around all of the different categories, from Landscape Gardening and Bricklaying to Restaurant Service and Fashion Technology, to see the incredible work that these talented young people were able to create over the four days of competition.


In addition to watching the International Competition, visitors to the event were also able to 'Have a Go' at a wide range of skills, meet top employers and get specialist careers advice.

TEAM AUSTRALIA AGAINST THE REST OF THE WORLD

It took immense amounts of both physical and mental endurance for the *Skillaroos* to compete against their equally talented international peers. A high level of concentration, impeccable skills and incredibly tight time constraints were just some of the demands of competition that saw the months of training pay off for the *Skillaroos* as they battled it out to complete the highly challenging projects each day.

"There was so much to do, some really difficult tasks which would usually take three times as long in everyday work. The judges were counting down the last minute on the clock and I was still trying to finish the challenge; there was no room for error. There physically wasn't the time to go back and double-check what I had done, which I would always do at work. I simply had to try my hardest, trust my judgement and hope for the best."

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IN THE LEAD UP TO THE MAIN EVENT

The *Skillaroos* were announced in November 2010 following their success at the WorldSkills Australia National Competition, Brisbane in May of the same year.

In the lead up to the International Competition, Team Australia trained with their mentors and trainers for 10 months, with some *Skillaroos* travelling both nationally and internationally to participate in competitions and to practice test projects.

The *Skillaroos* were officially farewelled at a function held in Sydney in late September, 2011 before beginning the journey to London, with a detour through Paris.

The trip to France, arranged by WorldSkills Australia was included as a special team bonding exercise. The *Skillaroos* visited the First World War battlegrounds in Villers-Bretonneux, which was an incredibly inspirational and valuable experience. The French experience also included a trip to the Eiffel Tower and an afternoon tea hosted by Mr. David A Ritchie, Australian Ambassador to France at the Australian Embassy in Paris.

From France, the *Skillaroos* travelled on the Eurostar to London, where they were treated to afternoon tea, a personal tour and an official address at the Australian High Commission in London. An action-packed excursion covering the historically rich city of London was then followed by two spectacular ceremonies for the opening and closing of the competition.

THE RESULTS

The WorldSkills Australia Team Australia Skillaroos, left the competition with an impressive collection of medals across a broad range of skill areas. WSA is pleased to report that even up against stronger competition and an increased number of competing countries, Australia's exceptional skills standards and vocational education and training have been reflected by our nation maintaining its ranking amongst the top ten in the world.

Taking home 25 medals – including one Gold, four Silver, five Bronze and fifteen Medallions of Excellence, Australia made an outstanding effort which has secured our ranking as the 7th best nation in the world.

From the 30th of August to the 1st of September 2012, over 500 of Australia's most highly skilled trainees and apprentices, aged between 16 and 23, will converge on Sydney Showground, Sydney Olympic Park, to compete in the WorldSkills Australia National Competition, Sydney 2012.

Competitors will have had to advance as Medallists from their Regional Competitions to secure a place on their regional team and be given the opportunity to compete in Australia's largest skills competition.

The competition space will be over 25,000 sqm and will house over 50 skill categories ranging from the traditional trades such as Electrical and Bricklaying, to the more contemporary skilled professions of Fashion Technology and IT Programming. Also included at the event will be the 11 VETIS categories and new demonstration categories.

The free-to-the-public event is expected to attract over 80,000 spectators over the three days of exciting competition. Attendees will be able to watch the competitors in their battle to be titled the best in Australia and potentially the best in the world.

Visitors to the event will also have the chance to participate in the fun and interactive *Try'aTrade* activities which will be on offer across an extensive range of areas from Bricklaying to Hairdressing.

In addition to this, the WorldSkills Australia National Competition, Sydney 2012 will include its first ever fully integrated careers and skills expo. It is here that thousands of visitors to the Competition will be able to gather information and speak to representatives from Industry, Government and vocational education and training sectors about career pathways and further education opportunities.

The WSA National Competition is a major event and without the support of our Government Partners and Industry sponsors, and the hard work and passion of the dedicated WSA volunteers, WorldSkills Australia would not be able to provide a platform for Australia's best to benchmark their skills in the pursuit of excellence.

WHAT IS VETIS?

The WorldSkills Australia Vocational Education and Training in Schools (VETiS) program is a series of work-simulated projects based on industry standard frameworks which are designed and administered by practicing teachers and industry professionals. The competitions are open for students still attending secondary schools and colleges.

WSA VETIS Competitions operate on the same two year cycle as WSA Regional Competitions. VETIS Medallists from State and Regional Competitions are eligible to compete against their peers from around the country in the 11 VETIS categories offered at the WorldSkills Australia National Competition, Sydney 2012.

42ND WORLDSKILLS INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION, LEIPZIG, GERMANY, 2013.

On 2 July 2013, Leipzig Trade Fair will be opening its doors to over 1,000 competitors, 2,000 experts, 3,000 volunteers and 200,000 visitors for the 42nd WorldSkills International Competition.

It is here that the world's most skilled young people from 58 countries and regions will be competing in 43 skill areas for the prestigious title of world champion.

Once the results are announced from the WorldSkills Australia National Competition, Sydney 2012, Medallists may then be eligible for selection as part of the 2013 Team Australia *Skillaroos* who will travel to Leipzig in a bid to be titled the world's best in their chosen skill area.

The 2013 Team Australia *Skillaroos* will be officially announced in November of 2012.

MoVE RESEARCH MODELLING VOCATIONAL **EXCELLENCE RESEARCH EXPLAINED**

The Modelling of Vocational Excellence (MoVE) research project is an initiative which aims to identify, develop and promote the key characteristics of excellence in trade and vocational skills.

WorldSkills Australia, Dusseldorp Skills Forum and RMIT University joined the MoVE project in 2010 as a result of the research being conducted by the Research Centre for Vocational Excellence at the University of Tampere in Finland.

The research project began at the WorldSkills International Competition in Helsinki (2005) and was continued at the competition held in Japan (2007). The project involved the collection of data from international WorldSkills competitors, their trainers, families, employers and judges.

Data is collected through a series of surveys which are shaped around a multidimensional theoretical framework, which analyses the processes of influences on cognitive and social development, goal orientation and adaptive learning.

The Australian research team administered a survey, which had been developed from the Finnish project, on 50 percent of the competitors at the WorldSkills Australia National Competition held in Brisbane in 2010.

The overall finding from a selection of the data collected at the WorldSkills Australia National Competition, Brisbane 2010 was that 71 percent of competitors highly valued their association with WorldSkills Australia, with 26 percent stating that they found it to be better than expected and 45 percent reporting that it was much better than expected.

In addition to this, the results also illustrated that an overwhelming majority of national competitors regarded WorldSkills as likely to be beneficial to their career, with 62 percent claiming that it would be significant and 15 percent saying it would be crucial.

Over time, MoVE aims to build a thorough understanding of what characteristics define vocational excellence and apply that knowledge to improve the support and delivery of WorldSkills competitions and vocational training Australia wide.

The long-term aim of the Finnish/Australia MoVE project, with the support of WorldSkills International and the newly formed WorldSkills Foundation, is to extend the project to include other WorldSkills International members and use the findings gathered to provide other national teams with feedback on their effectiveness and to enable another platform for international benchmarking.

The completed WSA research findings will be available in mid 2012.

GREEN TEAM WORLDSKILLS AUSTRALIA'S GREEN TEAM

WorldSkills Australia hosts some of the nation's largest and most logistically-complex events, catering for over 50 different skill categories at the biennial WorldSkills Australia National Competitions.

In order to run these skill categories, significant quantities of water, energy and various materials that can create waste are heavily utilised.

Faced with these challenges, Dusseldorp Skills Forum and WSA worked together on an innovative project for the 2008 and 2010 WSA National Competitions - the Green Team.

The inaugural 2008 Green Team comprised of TAFE Event Management students and university Environment Management students trained to conduct an Environmental Review. An Environmental Management Plan (EMP) guided the review, allowing the Green Team's work to conform to internationally recognised ISO14004 standards. The 2008 EMP provided WSA with an event sustainability blueprint for continuous improvement.

The Green Team used the Victorian EPA's Event Footprint Calculator to calculate the impact of the event in 2008 and again in 2010. In order to reduce the environmental impact of the competitions, WSA focused its attention on systematically reducing the energy, materials, water consumed and waste generated by the competitors, as this has a large impact in the vocational education system and in workplaces across Australia.

At its 2010 competition in Brisbane, WSA renewed the 'Green Team' project based on the knowledge gathered from the 2008 competition. The Green Team assembled under the guidance of the lead auditor, ARUP, to audit each competition area, considering the sustainability of project designs, the efficient use of materials, water and energy, and waste management at the competition.



The success of this strategy is shown at the 2010 nationals by a 22 percent reduction in the event footprint despite substantial growth in the scale of the event (17,500 sgm in 2008 compared with 25,000 sgm in 2010), largely achieved by recycling 88 percent of the waste generated. Further evidence showed that 70 percent of categories had energy-efficient procedures and 64 percent of relevant categories used a water-efficient judging criteria and water-saving devices.

Bevond the substantial WSA movement, there is now evidence that vocational educators are adopting Green Team outputs as best practice. For example, the award winning 2010 Bricklaying Category project - which significantly reduced water use, eliminated toxic chemicals and reduced materials use – is being taken up by Queensland TAFE colleges.

All of this indicates that the Green Team project is on track to influence apprentices and trainees nationally by providing a practical demonstration of skills for sustainability and peer leadership amongst students and vocational educators.

WSA is raising the standards of sustainability in vocational education and training and equipping a new generation of business leaders with the skills for sustainability that will drive our future economy.

INTERNATIONAL PATHWAYS

WorldSkills Australia National Competitions provide selected competitors with the pathway to pursue further skills development overseas through study or work experience. It is the aim of WSA to provide all Gold Medallists from the National Competitions with the opportunity of an International Pathway.

The WorldSkills Australia National Competition, Brisbane 2010 provided International Pathways to 16 competitors, other than the *Skillaroos*, who had shown their dedication to excellence in skills. Three of the competitors received Australian Overseas Fund (AOF) scholarships and 13 were selected as recipients for the BBM Scholarships.



BBM LIMITED SCHOLARSHIPS

The BBM Scholarship is recognised as a valuable and prestigious award for acknowledging and rewarding excellence in skills. BBM became a prominent International Pathway for WorldSkills Australia in 2000, when the two organisations first partnered to select and grant young and skilled competitors with scholarships.

There were 13 Gold Medallists from the WorldSkills Australia National Competition, Brisbane 2010 who received BBM Scholarships. The scholarship provides recipients with a trip to the UK to participate in a two-week leadership and development program with Mission Performance.

Each of the BBM Scholarship recipients are also encouraged to seek work placement and take advantage of their overseas experience.

The next selection of BBM Scholarship recipients will be announced in 2012.

THE AUSTRALIAN OVERSEAS FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS

The Australian Overseas Foundation (AOF) was established to provide talented young Australians who have completed a trade or apprenticeship with the opportunity to travel overseas to develop not only work skills but also life skills. This is achieved through providing scholarships to ambitious young people to pursue their goals by awarding a select few with financial assistance to do so.

The scholarship is designed to fund young trainees and apprentices to travel and work overseas. Scholarship recipients are provided with initial assistance to set up a work placement and accommodation but are given the freedom to organise everything else for their own overseas experience.

Upon their return home they bring with them their new skills and experiences for the benefit of their own career development and Australian industry.

WorldSkills Australia has been affiliated with the AOF since 2003 and assists with the application process for WorldSkills Australia National Competition Medallists.

NATIONAL SKILLS WEEK

National Skills Week is a new initiative, launched in 2011, with the primary purpose of highlighting and celebrating vocational education and training nationwide.

National Skills Week coincided with the 41st WorldSkills International Competition in London and highlighted the achievements of the *Skillaroos* as shining examples of young Australians enjoying international success though a skill-based career pathway.

Senator The Hon Chris Evans. Minister for Tertiary Education, Skills, Jobs and Workplace Relations launched National Skills Week saying:



WSA IN THE MEDIA GETTING THE WORLDSKILLS AUSTRALIA MESSAGE OUT

WSA also worked with SkillsOne television to generate more coverage for the organisation; SkillsOne produced several segments for WSA that went to air on Aurora Channel 183 (Foxtel & Austar) during 2011.

Since September 2011, SkillsOne TV has been broadcasting on Television 4 (Digital Channel) in Regional NSW & Victoria, increasing the reach to a targeted audience of careers advisors, teachers, parents, students and apprentices.



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21st CENTURY SKILL AMBASSADORS JOSH STEMM TAKES ON THE WORLD

He owns a Cadillac. a Hummer, a Kawasaki motorbike and a 19 foot boat. He lives in Dubai and studies in England, but according to Josh Stemm, he is just a regular 25-year-old bloke from Brisbane who happens to be great with an engine and now has the world at his feet.

Since beginning his WorldSkills journey, Josh has travelled to both the highest and lowest points of the planet and it looks like his travelling has only just started.

Josh began his apprenticeship in Light Vehicle Automotive Mechanics in 2003 following the completion of Year 12. Initially Josh was unsure of which pathway he would take, however he did know that university was not right for him. Josh describes himself as a hands-on individual, and with this in mind he approached Eagers Holden in Newstead, Brisbane for work experience. His hard work and enthusiasm secured him a full-time position as well as an apprenticeship with the well-known dealer.

Josh became involved in WorldSkills Australia during his time at the Brisbane North Institute of TAFE. His dedicated attitude made him a prime contender for the WorldSkills competitions. Josh says "I was pushed into WorldSkills by a head teacher who was impressed by my work ethic and commitment." As a result he came out on top at the 2005 Brisbane WorldSkills Regional Competition. He later competed at the WorldSkills Australia National Competition, Melbourne 2006 where he placed 6th in Australia.

However Josh's success didn't end there, he was awarded the 2006 Apprentice of the Year at the Queensland Training Awards and later accepted a scholarship to study and work overseas through the Queensland Overseas Foundation (QOF). The QOF provide young people with the opportunity to travel and work overseas in order to develop skills that can be later brought back to Australia. Josh has also completed training in Detroit, Michigan at the General Motors Head Office in the United States.

Since being awarded the QOF scholarship, Josh has been working at General Motors in Dubai as a Technical Assistant. Josh is responsible for supporting motor vehicle dealers in the Middle East with mechanical repairs. If the dealership is unable to repair the vehicle, Josh then flies over to assist the dealer in person. As a result Josh currently has 105 stamps in his passport indicating the number of trips he has already made. The number of stamps continues to grow.

Josh admits that his collection of 'toys' are a definite highlight of working and living in Dubai. At present he owns a Cadillac CTSV 6.2 litre V8 which according to Josh has the ability to go from zero to 100 kilometres per hour in 3.9 seconds. He also owns a H3T Hummer, a Kawasaki KX250 as well as a 19 foot Mastercraft boat that has a 5.7 litre V8 engine. the same that can be found in a Corvette.

Due to the United Arab Emirates being an Islamic State, religious holidays are regular occurrences. This gives Josh the flexibility to pursue his other passion, travelling. Josh has recently visited Mt Everest, Israel and Europe and he continues to add new destinations to his list of places to see and do.

Josh credits WorldSkills Australia for the confidence he has gained both personally and professionally.

You don't know how good you are until you put your skills to the test. Competing in WorldSkills competitions not only helps to develop your skills but it makes you want to work harder in your trade and to be the best you can be.
