The Year In Review

Taking part is about more than winning a medal

We create opportunities for young men and women to become the very best versions of themselves possible. When young Australians compete at one of WorldSkills' Regional, National or International competitions, they're fostering their communication, teamwork, organisation, and leadership skills. They're empowering themselves with the most elite skillset they possibly can, and preparing for future success, whatever careers path they eventually travel.

2016 NATIONALS

The 2016 WorldSkills Australia National Championships were held from 6-8 October at Melbourne Showgrounds. Supported by the Victorian Government, the event was the culmination of months of training for over 500 Competitors, who earned their spot in Melbourne after medalling at the regional level in 2015.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS: 2016 NATIONALS

- Competitors came from across Australia, were aged between 16-24 years and represented 60 trades and skills
- Competitors spent 16-20 hours across three days completing projects aligned with National Training Packages
- Overseen by 300 judges and assisted by 120 dedicated volunteers
- 159 gold, silver and bronze medals awarded
- Milestone moments include the first ever gold medal wins by females in Heavy Vehicle Mechanics, Turning and Vehicle Painting
- Try'aSkill activities across 19 skills offered Bricklaying, Carpentry, Electrical, Baking, Beauty Therapy and Vocational Health were the
- Skills Village enabled visitors to speak with leading industry organisations and careers advisors about opportunities for Vocational Education and Training (VET) spread across 24 stands from various training institutions
- An estimated \$10 million worth of materials and equipment used
- 70% provided in-kind by partners, industry organisations, TAFEs and training institutions
- 21,000 local, interstate and international visitors attended, including a delegation from India
- \$20 million worth of economic benefit for the state of Victoria yielded.

2017 REGIONALS

Between January-June 2017, WorldSkills Australia held a range of Regional Competitions in each state and territory. The Regional Competitions were open to anyone working as an apprentice, undertaking skills training at one of Australia's many TAFEs and training institutes, or participating in a VET in School program.

New Regions This Year

This year Victoria was allocated three additional regions - Melbourne East, Gippsland and Sunraysia - taking its total from five to eight. The adjustment was recommended by the Victorian Regional Coordinator and the Victorian TAFE Association, following a review of Victoria's participation figures at the 2015 Regional Competitions and 2016 National Competition that indicated the size and distance of its existing regions was discouraging participation. Another region, Vic Country, was renamed SW Victoria, with all changes in place for the start of the 2017 Regional round of competition.

Victoria introduced a Central Steering Committee this year, with representatives from each of the eight regions on the committee. Elsewhere, Wide Bay QLD was renamed East Coast QLD and Southern QLD was renamed South West QLD.



Regional Competition Breakdown

Thirty-six regional competitions were run before 30 June 2017, and 630 competitions are scheduled to have been run by 31 October 2017:

2017 SKILLS SQUAD

The Skills Squad is an elite team of young men and women who have earned a position on the squad following a rigorous selection process, in conjunction with their medal winning performance at a WorldSkills Australia National Championship. After selection, these young champions undergo intensive training, with the end goal of selection as a Skillaroo and the opportunity to compete at the International Competition in sight.

The 2016-17 Skills Squad was selected in November 2016 following the Nationals in Melbourne. This year's team comprised 24 Competitors, in 23 Skills. The squad was selected in several stages. Firstly, Competitors and Experts were invited to submit a formal application. The applications were reviewed by a panel alongside an analysis of how each skill had performed against other member nations over the last three International Competitions.

The Skills Squad's core purpose is to act as a training squad for the International Competition. Competitors and Experts are required to submit a training plan, report monthly and meet milestones in their training. The final selection of the 2017 Skillaroos was held at the 2017 Global Skills Challenge in July 2017 in Newcastle.

Skills Squad Fundraising - GoFundMe

For the first time this year, an online crowdfunding platform, GoFundMe, was used to showcase the Skills Squad members to their family and friends, and to raise money to support the members in their training journeys. The effort was very successful with more than \$50,000 raised during this first experience of fundraising via an online platform. In addition to seeking online donations, many Skills Squad members chose to hold fundraising events in their communities to bolster their individual fundraising efforts.

Looking Ahead - 2017 Global Skills Challenge - Newcastle, NSW

The 2017 Global Skills Challenge (GSC) is planned to be held in Newcastle, NSW from 4-8 July 2017. Supported by TAFE NSW Managing Director Jon Black, WesTrac and Newcastle City Council, the event will be staged over four areas - TAFE NSW

Newcastle, Hamilton and Glendale campuses, and in Industry at the WesTrac facility in Tomago. It will use six accommodation venues, three TAFE NSW Venues, Westrac, and Surfhouse Mereweather. A total of 13 countries are represented - Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, France, Japan, Hong Kong, Malaysia, Morocco, New Zealand, Russia, Taiwan, UK, USA - across 22 Skill areas.

The event will take place three months ahead of the International Competition, and will be the final stage in the selection process for the announcement of Team Australia and the 2017 Skillaroos. It is valuable in enabling networking, ideas sharing, and standards training ahead of the International competition in Abu Dhabi for all Experts, and for the four Technical Delegates from Russia, Korea, Malaysia and New Zealand in their roles as Competition Delegates.

The 2016 National Championship reminded us of the value of our volunteers across the country, who are absolutely dedicated to making WorldSkills events as successful, memorable and powerful as they can be for our Competitors.

A national event requires up to 300 dedicated volunteers to make it happen. These volunteers take on roles of Competition Judges. Workshop 2018 National Championships have already Convenors, Floor Assistants, and more, in support of creating an industry-leading platform for young Australians to compete to be the best in their skill.

Volunteers were engaged through local TAFE and events/hospitality courses and through rotaries. Some were long-standing volunteers from different regional committees; others past Skillaroos who led tours for school groups and visitors

Feedback from visitors to the event praised the environment and the atmosphere of competition, which couldn't happen without all the work put in behind the scenes. So thank you to all our volunteers, we appreciate you and all that you do.

WORLDSKILLS AUSTRALIA VOLUNTEERS ROLES

Volunteering with WorldSkills Australia is a great opportunity to develop new skills while supporting talented young apprentices on their journey to become experts in their field. By contributing your time and knowledge, you can make a real difference to the lives of thousands of young Australians - while having plenty of fun along the way. There are many volunteer roles available as part of the WorldSkills Australia network, across a wide variety of skills.



Alongside comprehensive industry knowledge, a Skill Manager has previous experience as a National Chief Judge/International Expert, providing leadership to their allocated Skill Cluster, and is one of the key contacts for WorldSkills Australia staff. The Skill Manager provides mentoring and advice to the Skill and is the point of contact for any issues and disputes. Normally, they are International Experts.



A Judge's primary role is to use their experience and expertise to fairly assess Competitors during a skill competition. They bring a wealth of knowledge from a relevant industry or the education sector.



Chief Judge

A Chief Judge works with the Skill Manager to prepare and execute the skill competition seamlessly. With significant experience within a skill, they provide guidance for WorldSkills Australia, Site Management, Skill Managers and Assessment Advisors. They manage the day-to-day logistics of running a Skill and are the main point of contact for the Skill.



Deputy Chief Judge

Previously referred to as Convenors, Workshop Managers work on-site at the competition and assist with event preparation. They assist Judges and Skill Managers to conduct the competition, which may involve setting up and maintaining the equipment.

AUSTRALIAN APPRENTICESHIPS AMBASSADORS

WorldSkills Australia works closely with the Department of Education and Training, who managed the Australian Apprenticeships Ambassadors Program. All gold medalists from National Championships can become an Ambassador, as well as Skills Squad members.

Currently more than 100 individuals across all states and territories are Ambassadors. This program aims to raise the status of Australian Apprenticeships by profiling real national apprenticeship and traineeship success stories. It showcases the inspiring benefits of the Australian Apprenticeships system to school leavers, career changers of all ages, and business audiences.



THE ERN MACDONALD FELLOWSHIP

To Ern MacDonald, who has been credited with changing the face of labour relations in the Australian construction industry, nothing was more important than recognising and encouraging the development of skills in young people. Established in 2006 by WorldSkills Australia, the Dusseldorp Skills Forum and the MacDonald Family, in honour of Ern MacDonald, this fellowship aims to assist young tradespeople working in the building and construction industry to launch their careers.

The winner is awarded a scholarship to assist them to implement their project plans. Past fellowship winners have used scholarship funding to start their own businesses, travel overseas, invest in further study or implement innovative and sustainable projects that assist their broader community.



ABBTF WORLD CLASS BRICKLAYER DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIP

The goal of this scholarship is to provide support for the bricklaying Skillaroo, which will help them to achieve the highest possible level of skill and compete successfully against Competitors from other countries in the WorldSkills International Competition.



QUEENSLAND OVERSEAS FOUNDATION (QOF) SCHOLARSHIP

The QOF scholarship gives recipients the opportunity to work at the overseas destination of their choice by funding their return airfare and initial expenses. WorldSkills Australia Competitors who have completed a trade apprenticeship or vocational traineeship to Certificate Level III have an opportunity to be awarded the AOF scholarship which enables the recipient to travel and work overseas. The aim of the AOF scholarship is to develop and increase young apprentices' and trainees' knowledge, experience and leadership skills.



BIG BROTHER MOVEMENT (BBM) SKILLED FUTURES PROGRAM

A joint effort by WorldSkills Australia and BBM Youth Support, the BBM Skilled Futures Program scholarship offers Competitors who medalled at national level but cannot progress through to the International Competition the opportunity to participate in a two-week leadership development course and four weeks of international work experience.



Opinion
